Hospice Harmonization Plan

The Hospice Society has been advised that Interior Health wants to create equity of funding across hospices starting in 2019. This will not lower amount of funds already granted, rather to add funding to hospices that are not currently receiving grants from IH. They are also looking at revising the wording of contracts to be more consistent amongst the various hospice societies that are already receiving funding.

Interior Health has scheduled the implementation of a community hospice bed at Trinity Care Centre and two in Oliver at McKinney Place during the 2018/19 fiscal year.

Advance Care Planning

Be brave enough to start a conversation that matters

Advance care planning is making a plan for your future health care while you're still able to make

health care decisions for yourself. Even if you're doing well now, it's a good idea to prepare in case you're badly hurt or develop a serious illness. As long as you can still make your own decisions, your advance care plan won't be used. You can say "yes" or "no" or change your mind about treatments, including changing or cancelling your advance care plan at any time.

An advance care plan helps to make sure that your wishes are respected because your loved ones and doctors can use the information in your advance care plan to make treatment choices for you, if you can't make them for yourself. Having a plan eases the burden on your family so that they don't have to decide what is best for you. If you've done an advance care plan, share it with your loved ones and your doctor. Your plans will do no good if no one knows about them.

Volunteer Report

What keeps our volunteers here varies considerably, however, they all say "we always receive much more than we give."

We are proud of our low turnover - it shows us that this is a great place to volunteer. We have volunteers who have been with us for decades and some that have been with the society since before Moog and Friends Hospice House. That in itself speaks volumes to our program and the respect that the rest of our hospice team has for these people.

These special volunteers participate in a training program that prepares them to take care of practical tasks or simply extend a hand to hold to hospice patients and their families. Volunteers may run errands, help prepare a meal or feed someone, read to a patient, or just share some quiet time. Their presence can make it possible for a caregiver to take a needed break for a few hours. Our volunteer team is extremely important to Hospice House and the community program. They provide crucial help to patients and their families. These services offer patients and their families the chance to have trained volunteers visit them wherever they live, to offer companionship and a helping hand.

I look at our volunteers as ambassadors representing Hospice and the palliative program. They are used to the surprised reactions when people find out they are a hospice volunteer. The first thing out of most people's mouth is, "how can you do that?" Here are a couple of their responses:

"It's truly rewarding to deal with folks who really have a need for your help."

"I'm providing something for them they can't get anywhere else. That's why I can do it, and love to do it."

I am so moved by the level at which people show up: their commitment, their engagement for what we ask them to do and their love of the work. It's truly inspiring. Every day that I work with them I'm re-inspired; the enthusiasm and dedication is infectious. In the midst of it, they keep a light heart. There is always a fun side of this work; there is no exception to that. Volunteers find the lightness in it and it's quite magnificent. They bring joy and jokes and in a time when our culture perceives this as the most difficult thing we can all experience: death. There is no doubt it is difficult, but our volunteers find the joy and purpose in being there.

Hospice Society Helps Habitat for Skinks

Habitat for skinks, little lizards with no neck and short legs, is being improved at Hospice House in cooperation with Interior Health. Due to construction at Penticton Regional Hospital, skinks, who make their homes in dry rocky slopes, are being displaced. A study recommends that new habitat be prepared on hospital and hospice property for the skinks who are at risk of becoming an endangered species.

In recent years, skinks have become popular reptile pets and are usually bred in captivity for this purpose. A unique feature of the skink is its blue tail which can become detached if attacked by a predator. The blue tail grows back again.
