Volunteer Report Linda Brooks, Volunteer Coordinator



Volunteer Coordinator Report October 2021

Services provided by the volunteers under the Penticton and District Hospice Society were reinstated on Sept 10, 2021.

We continue with three shifts daily at Moog and Friends, pet therapy every Wednesday afternoon, music therapy, with harp on Thursday mornings, piano every Tuesday morning.

Our palliative massage team consists of 2 ladies and 1 gentleman now. They rotate coming into Hospice house. Two of our team will provide these services to our community palliative clients in their homes once we are allowed to go back into the community. At this point we only have two clients we are visiting at home and that is only because they are greatly in need of help. We hope to return to this service fully by the end of November.

Our volunteer that has been making gowns for the last 11 years is back and has put a lot of effort into making new gowns and fixing any that need some TLC. She continues making the longer bibs and will be making new beanbags for door stops.

Before COVID we had volunteers who were coming into bake in our family kitchen but we are still in a holding pattern with our common areas all closed. Visitors are at a maximum of two at a time and they are to go directly to patient rooms.

Nurses and social workers continue to provide positive feedback on the volunteer program. Covid highlighted the unique support the volunteers bring to not only residents and their families but staff as well.

At present, we have 48 volunteers with the Penticton and District Hospice Society. This number does not include those who have not yet returned for a number of reasons. We have 14 volunteers who plan on returning to Hospice when they have fulfilled their present commitments. I have interviewed a number of new people and plan on hosting a training in the New Year. I am not yet able to host a volunteer training right now because of the numbers that would gather here. I hope that 2022 allows that to happen early in the New Year. This training will be over a period of two weeks and 36 hours long.





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
