I try to catch as many of you as I can when you come into hospice to thank you for being here. I want you to know how important you are and what you mean to our Society and our whole community. Some of you hear it all the time and might be tired of my placating and others who I don't see often never hear it at all. I read a lot about volunteerism as a whole and how communities would fail without that support. A few weeks ago, I read a speech which was based on the poem by Linda Ellis. "The Dash-" This of course led me to read the poem. Based on those readings this is my take on what you mean to us.

Life is short, and we see that especially in our work. Even patients we meet who are in their 80's and 90's often tell us, "How fast the time went"!

Our planet has been here for millions of years – our universe billions. On our headstones will be the etching of when we were born and the date when we died. (For example, 1960 – 2050) It's not those two years mentioned that matter the most. It is the Dash in between. That little Dash-That's our life. Hospice care is based on a holistic model that seeks to enhance a person's quality of life and actively support their emotional, physical, mental and spiritual needs and wishes. A person can receive hospice care within their own home or in any care setting.

Why Refer to Your Local Hospice Society?

Trained hospice volunteers can provide a variety of services and support including advance care planning, companionship, caregiver respite, grief and bereavement support and much more.
